

30 YEARS OF TRAILS, COMMUNITY, AND CONNECTION



This year marks a milestone for the Trails Foundation of Northern Utah (previously Weber Pathways) – our 30th anniversary of protecting, building, and celebrating the trails that connect our community to nature and to one another. What began in 1995 as a small group of dedicated trail advocates has grown into a region-wide movement of volunteers, partners, and outdoor enthusiasts working together to ensure that the trails we love remain accessible, safe, and sustainable for generations to come.

HONORING THREE DECADES OF IMPACT

Over the past three decades, TFNU has worked hand-in-hand with local governments, land managers, and community members to develop and maintain hundreds of miles of trails and pathways throughout Weber County and beyond. Our efforts have transformed the way people experience the outdoors – from morning runs along the Bonneville Shoreline Trail to family rides around Pineview Reservoir and evening walks on the Rail Trail. Every step, pedal, gallop and stride on these trails is part of our shared story.

We want to extend our heartfelt thanks to the past and present Board members, staff, and volunteers who have poured their time, passion, and expertise into this mission. Your hard work has shaped not only the trails beneath our feet but also the culture of stewardship and community pride that defines Northern Utah's trail system today.

KEY PROJECTS THAT SHAPE OUR FUTURE

While we take time to reflect on our past, we're equally excited about what's ahead. Several cornerstone projects are helping define the next era of trail development and access in Northern Utah:

- **Weber River Pathway (WRP)** – This vital corridor is a cornerstone of regional connectivity, offering both recreation and transportation opportunities. TFNU continues to play a key role in coordinating with local partners to extend and maintain this scenic route that follows the river through the heart of Weber County.
- **Pineview Loop Pathway** – A longtime community favorite, this multi-use path has become a symbol of what collaboration can achieve. We're actively working on improvements and expansions to ensure it remains safe, accessible, and enjoyable for cyclists, runners, and families year-round.
- **Rail Trail** – Once an historic rail line, now a lifeline for recreation, the Rail Trail showcases the power of reimagining old infrastructure for new generations. Ongoing maintenance and enhancements keep this beloved trail a reliable route for outdoor enthusiasts of all kinds.
- **Coldwater Canyon** – As more people discover the beauty of Coldwater Canyon, TFNU has been focused on erosion control, signage improvements, and sustainability measures to protect this special area for hikers and trail runners who seek a peaceful retreat close to home.

- **North Fork Park** – A true gem of Weber County, North Fork Park offers some of the most diverse trail opportunities in our region. Our partnership with Weber County Parks and Recreation has a great history of helping to improve trail conditions, signage, and connectivity, ensuring the park remains a year-round hub for hiking, equestrian use, biking, skiing, and community events.
- **27th Street TH** – Thanks to a generous donation of approximately 100 acres of property east of the top of 27th street to TFNU with the stipulation that a parking lot trailhead be developed and the area remain open space to the public, we are moving forward with a beautiful facility for trail users.

CELEBRATING OUR SUPPORTERS

None of this would be possible without the generous support of our members, donors, and community partners. 

BOARD CHAIR REPORT



This year TFNU (also Weber Pathways) celebrated its 30th year anniversary. As we look back on the past 30 years we can celebrate the many accomplishments of this organization. Extensions of the BST in North and South Ogden, the Rail Trail in west Weber county, new trails in Ogden Valley and North Fork Park, and many years of maintenance and improvement of the current trail system in Weber County are all significant projects completed by TFNU. While we have accomplished the completion of many projects, we still have active legacy projects such as the Weber River Parkway, Pineview Loop Pathway, and the Ogden Canyon Trail. While these projects await further permissions and funding to continue, they are still trails the public can use and enjoy and someday in the near future we will see the completion of these projects.

I would like to thank all current and former Board members and Staff for all the hard work, determination, and passion that has made these trails possible. Without your help none of this could have taken place. In addition, I would like to thank the many municipalities (the cities of Ogden, Riverdale, Mariott Slaterville, North and South Ogden, Farr West, Weber County) we have partnered with along with government entities (UDOT, Forest Service) and utilities (Rocky Mountain Power). These partnerships have allowed TFNU to have access to open space and a means to plan and build fantastic trails within our community!

This year also marked the start of the 27th St Trailhead. Through a generous donation of over 100 acres at the top of 27th St and a major RAMP grant award, Phase 1 construction of this trail head began this spring and is expected to be completed in late Fall of this year. This trailhead will provide a starting point place for hikers and bikers, a place for families to gather, and help eliminate a congested and dangerous parking situation.

I look forward to next 30 years of TFNU projects that will improve the community we live in by providing a unique outdoor experience just a few steps from where we live!

WEBER RIVER PARKWAY REPORT OCTOBER 2025



I'm pleased to report that we did some big construction work on the Weber River this summer. At Blackner's Bend, we removed a large earthen levee next to the river and repurposed the material to build up what will become the main trail. The levee was not functioning to protect any structures or improvements, and with it gone the river will be able to expand into its floodplain in a more natural way, allowing more of the natural riparian habitat to grow and relieving the pressure on downstream properties during a flood event.

Unfortunately, we did not have all of the funding we needed to complete the project. We were unable to construct our bridge abutments, although the bridges that we had ordered were paid for and delivered. If you drive by on I-84, you may see them sitting out in the field. They will be safe there until they can be installed on the overflow channels of the river next summer. When complete, the bridges and main pathway will be raised above the 100-year flood level.

In addition, there will be a "habitat trail" closer to the river; it may be submerged during a high spring runoff but will be passable for the rest of the year.

One of our goals at Blackner's Bend has been to create habitat for juvenile native fish, especially the Bonneville cutthroat trout and the bluehead sucker. We carefully constructed some bays and pockets of water in 2020 according to an engineered plan, and then the river had ideas of its own. The flood of 2023 destroyed some of the planned habitat areas but created new ones that are serving the same purpose. This year's construction enhanced one of the new channels, and small fish are now abundant in its calm waters.

Further downstream, the damage to the parkway from the 2023 runoff remains unrepaired due to a lack of funding. We will need to reinforce and rebuild the riverbank in several areas, which will require bringing in big equipment and large boulders. In the meantime, a detour trail is being built around the most hazardous of the eroded areas; construction has been slow because the only practical route goes straight through a large patch of poison ivy, which has to be sprayed and killed section by section before we can get in there to work.

Our long-term vision is still to connect the trail all the way from Riverdale to the mouth of Weber Canyon, with a connection to the business park in Uintah. Some of the construction will have to wait for the rebuild of the I-84/Highway 89 interchange, and there are some property issues that need to be resolved, but we will keep plugging away at it!

27TH STREET TRAILHEAD REPORT



By the time you read this, Phase 1 of the 27th Street Trailhead, the parking area and trailhead pavilion, will have been completed. From the beginning when 100 acres of land were donated to TFNU, it has been a process to ensure that we were developing a trailhead that would benefit the community and the neighborhood.

The land was donated to TFNU to ensure that it remains open space and will never be developed. In addition, it was donated with the understanding that TFNU would put in a parking area and trailhead to help with the congestion from the parking on 27th and adjoining streets, providing safer access to the trails available from 27th Street. After communicating with the residents of the local area and researching the number of cars that are using 27th Street for trail access, we located the 60-car parking area in the best

location to alleviate most of the concerns of the neighbors. As security was a big concern, we partnered with Ogden City to provide security cameras in the parking area and pavilion that will be monitored by the Ogden City Police Department.

The pavilion will have kiosks with a local trail map and information about history and climbing in the local area. Picnic tables and benches have been provided in the pavilion to allow for relaxing before or after your hike and to enjoy the fantastic views from the pavilion.

We are now starting to work on Phase 2 of the trailhead, which will include water fountains, interpretive trails, improving the trails in the area and a dog park.

Due to the late finish of the work this year, we are planning to have the grand opening in the spring. The trailhead will be open for use throughout the winter, snow permitting.

2025 TRAIL WORK REPORT

The 2025 trail work season is starting to wind down with October bringing in consistent rainstorms and colder weather. This season we were able to host multiple volunteer events and also knock out some big projects with each of our partners.

In May we identified a substantial project based out of the Ogden Nature Center North Trailhead, on land that is owned by the City of Ogden. This area contained many dilapidated wetland crossings and also a fall line trail connecting to the BST that was unable to drain water, rendering it a muddy mess. Our repairs consisted of hauling out the old timbers from the crossings and replacing them with 3 boardwalks totaling close to 90 feet of fresh planks. To rehabilitate the muddy segment of trail, we were able to reroute the trail and intersection near the affected area to make roughly 900 feet of sustainable, grade appropriate trail. The end result of these projects was pretty cool to see.

A new trail connection was identified by GOAL and TFNU for the Northern Utah Trails Fest race, on Weber County land. This new connection was to link the north end of Moose Tracks to Traildemic allowing racers a safer, grade appropriate route on the course instead of the steep fall line horse trail that existed in the area. This terrain was steep and unforgiving to work through, with a ton of chainsaw work required. Once completed this new connection encompassed 2300 feet of new trail through beautiful old growth trees. Unfortunately due to weather conditions the

weekend of the NUT, this was not used in the race this year but will be a valuable connection for years to come.

We also partnered with the Forest Service this season to replace the failing bridge on Sardine Peak Trail. This was a heavy lift as the bridge that needed to be replaced was 0.60 miles into the woods, and also required over 40 2" by 12" by 16' boards, amongst other miscellaneous dimensional lumber. If you've ever found yourself in a spot of carrying this type of lumber over a half a mile, well you know that it can be a suffer fest. We were lucky enough to kindly ask the students of Weber Basin Job Corp to help us with this lift and they were up for the challenge! We completed the bridge build, and have completed a re-route to incorporate the new bridge into Sardine Peak trail as the new bridge was built in a slightly different location to allow the old bridge to stay open during construction. Unfortunately due to the current government shutdown and our Forest Service Trail Crew partner being unable to work it does not look like the old bridge will be decommissioned this season.

On the volunteer side of things, we ramped up our volunteer events tremendously this season. A lot of this effort was due to the trails committee crew stepping up and hosting volunteer efforts, big shout out to Connor, Ben and Mark to make these events happen! Volunteer efforts were hosted in the foothills on the BST, at North Fork Park, and up in the Art Nord area.

Weber Pathways was formed thirty years ago by a group of concerned citizens who wanted to see a public trail go up Ogden Canyon. Like any community led organization, there were a few bumps along the way. While there still isn't a trail through Ogden Canyon, so many amazing other things have come from that group. Trails were begun being built along the Wasatch Front in a very grassroots effort.

Fast forward 30 years and that small organization has become the Trails Foundation of Northern Utah. Still building trails, maintaining trails, advocating for trails and so much more, TFNU is leaving its mark on Ogden, Weber County and the surrounding areas. While our administration aren't the ones actually out on the trails performing the work, they are the ones sitting in meetings where the future of our trails and our community are being discussed and planned for and they are acting as the voice of our trail users and, in a sense, the trails themselves. Grants are being written, funding being secured, and so much work is being done to preserve our long-standing tradition of natural surface trails and the public's use of them.

To honor and recognize the contributions of everyone, TFNU hosted a quaint late summer get-together on the patio at Ogden Beer Company. At least 4 past Executive Directors were in attendance, along with several of the Weber Pathway's Charter Members, past board members and staff.

Copies of news articles from past newspaper articles about Weber Pathways, Ogden & Weber Trails, and other Op-ed pieces were displayed around the patio for people to reminisce over and the conversations and reunions were sweet.

It's not just rearing children that takes a village. Community gems such as public, multi-use natural surface trails, and the building and perpetual stewardship of those trails also takes a village. We couldn't ask for a better one to be in.

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY 2025 CELEBRATION

The first Saturday in June is National Trails Day. TFNU is proud to be an annual supporter of this important event that began as a national day of public events aimed at advocacy and trail service. Tens of thousands of hikers, bikers, paddlers, horseback riders, trail clubs, federal and local agencies, land trusts and businesses come together in partnership to advocate for, maintain, and clean up public lands and trails.

This year's national theme was "Leave it Better" and in partnership with Weber County RAMP's Free Summer Saturday Program, and in conjunction with the Farmer's Market Ogden, TFNU's local celebration of NTD is the biggest of its kind in Northern Utah.

Partnered with 15 other trail-focused vendors in the heart of Ogden City - during Farmers Market, we were able to distribute educational materials, offer educational activities, free printed trail maps, and more! With representatives from the Utah Mountain Lion Conservation Group, the Utah Department of Natural Resources, Ogden Valley Adaptive,

HawkWatch International, Fleet Feet, WSU Outdoor Program, Wasatch Peaks Credit Union, Weber Davis Mountain Biking Group, Back Country Horsemen of America, Huckleberry Hiking and Antelope Island State Park - we had something for everyone who walked through. In the week leading up to the event, we were also able to facilitate nearly 50 hours of cumulative volunteer trail work, engaging community members in hands-on stewardship. Projects included finishing new trail segments and restoring overused areas along the Quail Loop / Nature Center North trails, as well as providing crucial tread work on the BST in North Ogden to improve drainage and reduce erosion.

The TFNU Peak Challenge - sponsored by Wasatch Peaks Credit Union - opens each year at our NTD event and in just under 4 hours this year, we registered 130 participants!

Advocacy. Education. Maintenance. Responsible Recreation. Fun. This is how we "Leave it Better" as an organization and we thank our partners and community for jumping in and participating alongside us.

2025 PEAK CHALLENGE

SPONSORED BY WASATCH PEAKS CREDIT UNION

It's hard to believe that this was already our 3rd annual Peak Challenge! The excitement for this challenge is contagious within our trail community and it is so fun to see the different ways that people participate in it!

In 2025, we had a total of 242 participants sign up for the challenge. If you're not familiar with the TFNU Peak Challenge, it's a community wide event where we invite anyone who would like to try to sign up and commit to bagging (or summiting) the four iconic Ogden Mountain Peaks: Malans (6980'), Lewis (8031'), Mt. Ogden (9579') & Ben Lomond (9,712) over the course of the summer. If that sounds impressive, it is! It's a total elevation of 34,301'!

But... Being the third year, we added three bonus peaks for anyone needing to up their challenge game. 2025's bonus peaks were Willard Peak (9,763'), Frary Peak (at Antelope Island State Park) (6596') and the Bonus Peak of Your Choice with a special award going to the highest peak bagged. Well, the highest reported peak bagged this go around was The Grand at Mt. Timpanogos. Two of our participants bagged this one at an astonishing, and additional, 13,775'! If you're adding it up, that means that if you were to bag all 6 peaks (excluding the Grand), you'd be at a total elevation of 50,661' over one summer - and if you include the Grand: 64,436'!! Whew!

Our community is tough! You prove it each and every year when hundreds of you accept the challenge. For a small fee and with the promise of a sticker for each peak you bag, a finisher sticker and award if you bag all 4 - you invite your friends, check out TFNU Peak Flags, make your ascents to the tops of these mountains and take your all-important peak photos to send us! You get out there and work for it From groups of seasoned trail users, to families with young kids, grandparents and grandkids, dogs and their humans, old and young, our trails have something for everyone and this is your challenge to get out there, start exploring our local trails and prepare to accept the challenge again when it launches again next year at our National Trails Day Celebration Event on the first Saturday in June.

2025 FALL TRAIL MIXER AT THE MONARCH

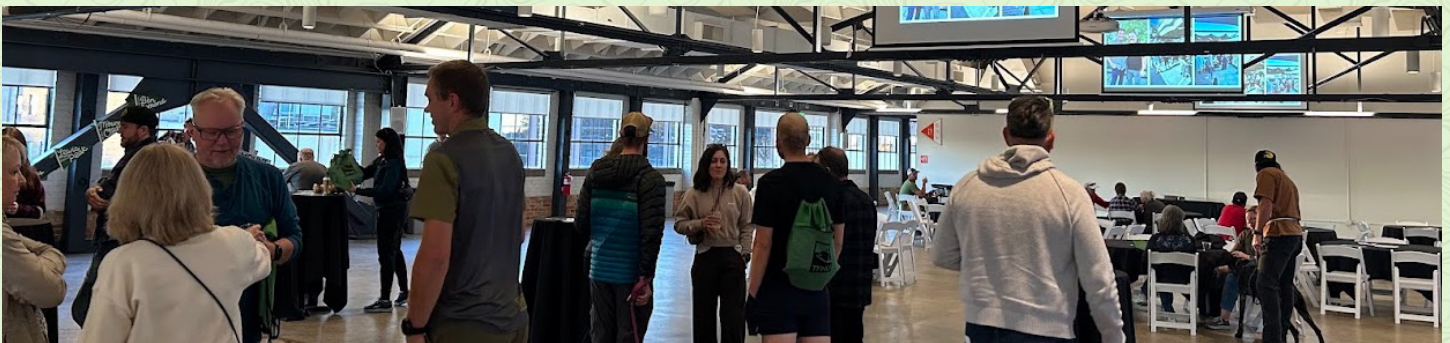
Each year, TFNU hosts a Free Community Trail Mixer Event at the Monarch in Downtown Ogden.

2026 TFNU AUTHOR EVENT

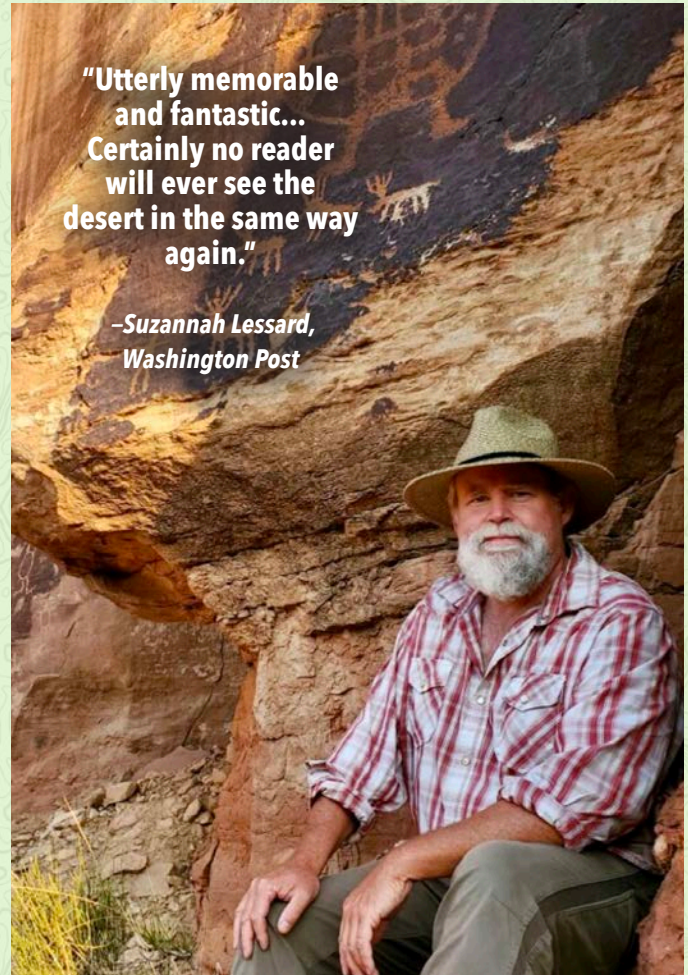
